2018-2019 ANNUAL REPORT

REFLECTIONS FROM A RECORD YEAR

While looking in the rearview mirror, it is easy to recognize that as an organization we have been forever changed in just 12 short months. The nature of our work did not shift. We fed hungry youth. Last year, FOCP provided 220,165 meals to 1,029 food-insecure students within five school districts and we accomplished that with 950 volunteers and 385 business partners.

We enhanced and evolved our services to meet the growing needs of local youth in ways we had not yet imagined. The addition of emergency winter feeding services led to a successful summer feeding pilot and FOCP ultimately expanded as a year-round resource for hunger-relief.

When record-breaking cold temperatures resulted in schools closing unexpectedly for consecutive days, the students we serve lacked access to their reliable school meals. With little notice, we rallied the support of the community and within 24 hours a team of 120 volunteers prepared and delivered a four-day food supply to over 800 students within 10 area communities. Using personal vehicles, volunteers ventured into sub-zero temperatures to deliver food packs to students at their homes. Our hearts were full.

The success of emergency feeding efforts led to brainstorming what summer feeding services could look like. Without our traditional distribution through backpacks at schools, the only feasible option to get food packs to those we serve was via home deliveries. Utilizing the process developed for emergency winter feeding would be too complicated and time intensive as a long-term solution. Through conversations with local stakeholders and a professional delivery business, a home-delivery process was devised. In June 2019, FOCP piloted a summer feeding program through which 350 youth received a monthly box with four weekends worth of food delivered directly to their homes. All boxes, materials, transportation and deliveries were provided in-kind, leaving only the expense of the food itself. Whether during an unexpected mid-week break or weekends during the school and summer months, students have access to nutritious supplemental meals and snacks.

With all of the “wonderful” included, it is not difficult to identify that it was the challenges that provided the most opportunity for our team to learn, be inspired to action and ultimately to grow.



We could not be more grateful for the opportunities this last year provided and the community support that has continued to ensure youth access to food as the basic fuel necessary for success in school, activities and life.

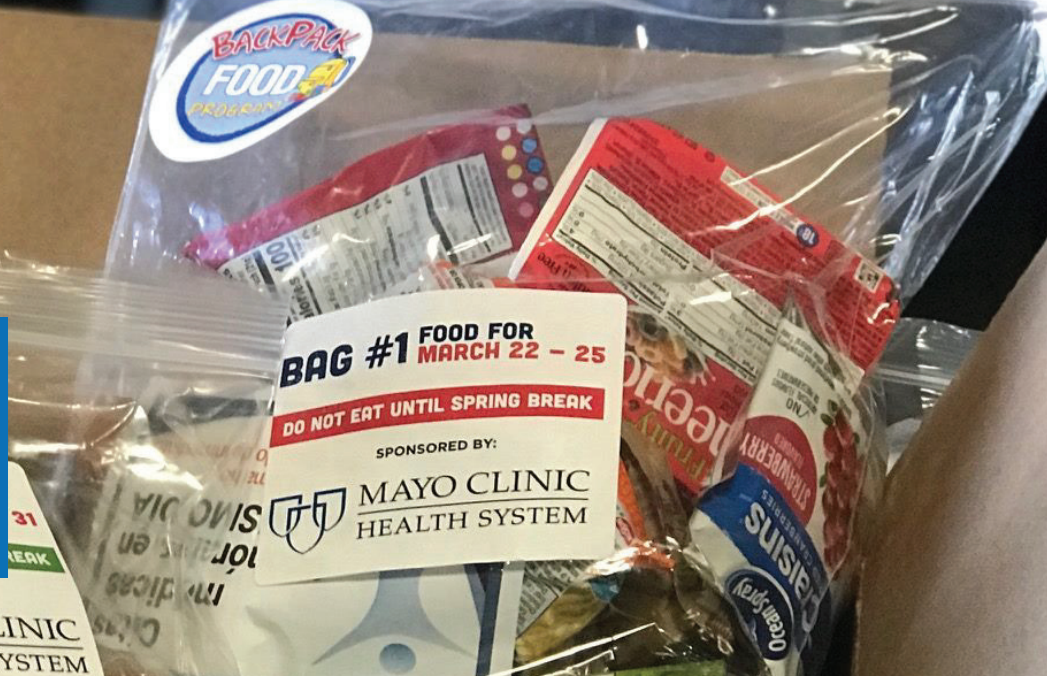

FOCP

FEEDING OUR COMMUNITIES PARTNERS

FOCP serves students who live in food-insecure households by providing child-friendly, well-balanced, single-serving food items to be consumed each day of the weekend and non-school days.

Food items include a breakfast, lunch and snacks and are free of cost to participants.

The food packs are assembled by volunteers, transported to schools and provided to teachers who discreetly place them in the backpacks or lockers of enrolled children.

Receiving no state or federal funding, FOCP relies on the support of community partners and volunteers to offer these programs to over 1,000 local youth throughout the school year.

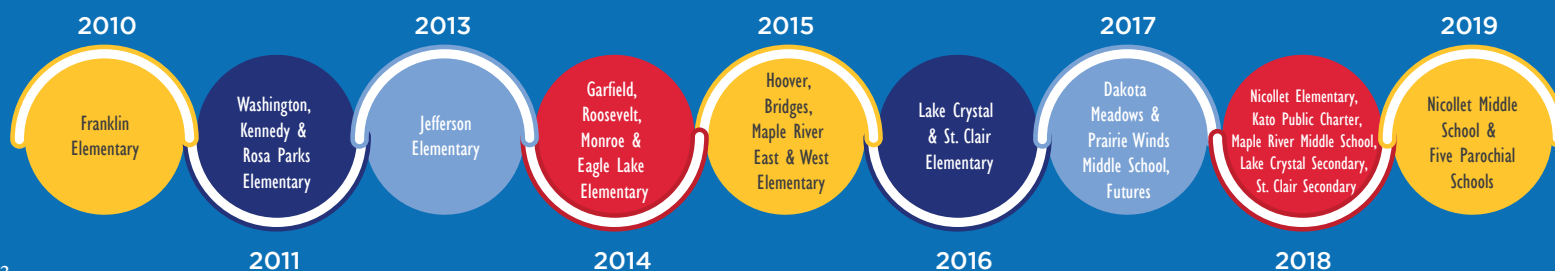

Where it all began...





Each food pack contains breakfast, lunch and snacks for each non-school day. Items are child-friendly to prepare and consume.

INSIDE THE FOODPACK:

We provide child-friendly, shelf-stable and single-serving items that are informed by USDA dietary guidelines.

Each daily menu provides approximately 677 calories each day (across breakfast, lunch and snacks). According to HHS/USDA dietary guidelines, children between 4-8 years need 1200-1400 calories and 9-13 years need 1400-2000.

Therefore, FOCP's food packs provide 48%-56% of the daily minimum calorie requirements for youth.

FOCP is a leader in youth hunger relief within the region. Programs honor any and all dietary restrictions or allergies that are on record with the school, including major religious restrictions. Several menus are created for each dietary restriction. FOCP has created a total of 590 different specialty menus to accommodate the diverse needs of students enrolled.

The daily calcium value of a foodpack is 23-34%. FOCP supplements food packs with monthly milk vouchers. Food items with dairy content are also provided in daily menus.

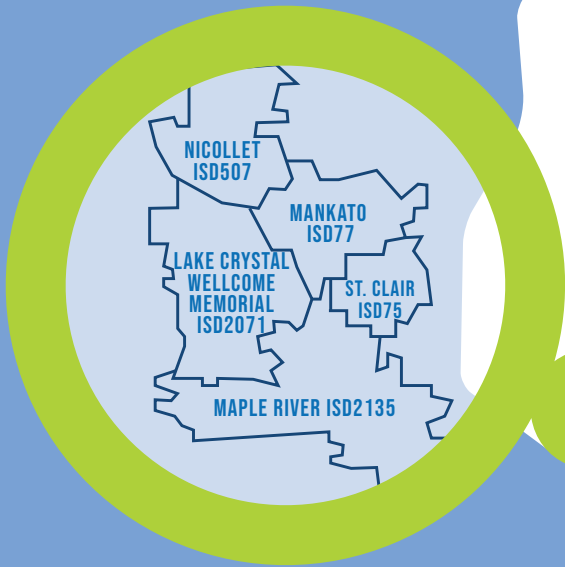


FOCP consults with a nutrition team comprised of registered dietitians and nutrition educators to ensure age-appropriate dietary needs are adequately met for the students enrolled in FOCP programs.



FOCP served over 1,000 students in 5 school districts, 10 communities and 21 schools.

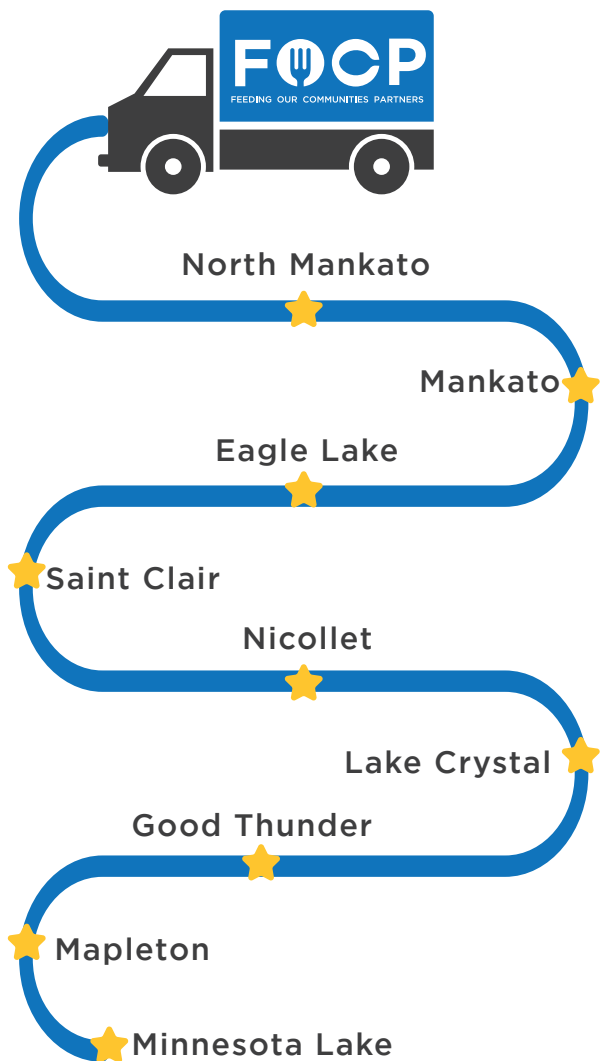


Within the five school districts served, an average of 35% of students rely upon the Free and Reduced Lunch Program. While students have access to breakfast and lunch during regular school days, some have limited or no access to food on weekends and school breaks.

Utilizing partnerships and volunteers, FOCP is capable of serving students in surrounding communities--eliminating barriers to adequate food for growing students.

EMERGENCY FEEDING:

Utilizing volunteers, FOCP may conduct emergency feeding services when school is unexpectedly cancelled for at least two or more consecutive days due to unforeseen weather or natural disaster. To eliminate the student-access barrier, food is prepared and delivered directly to a student's doorstep.



Each week, dedicated volunteers from outlying communities donate their time and labor to ensure food is delivered to enrolled students in surrounding communities.

OUTREACH

Over 950 unique volunteers assist in the preparation, transport and distribution of food packs annually. Volunteers prepare the food packs, aid in the shipment to schools and the distribution to school personnel. Each food pack is touched by at least nine hands before it reaches a child's backpack.

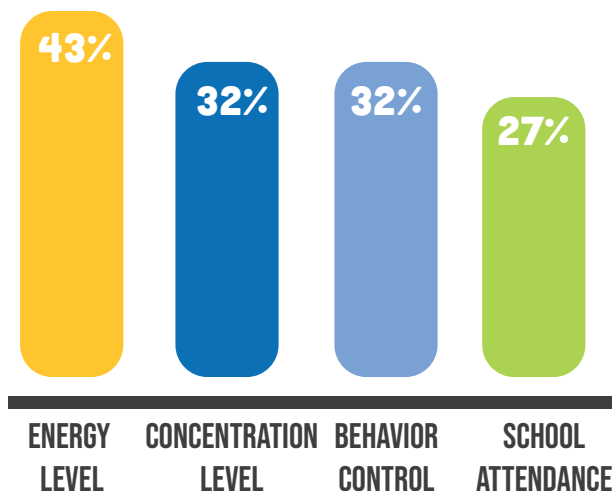
- ▶ Locally founded and funded, the **BackPack Food Program** provides food to elementary students on weekends and school breaks when access to adequate food may be limited.

JUN

To round out traditional school year services and to fill summer service gaps, FOCP launched a pilot program in the summer of 2019 aimed at serving students from June through August. Partnering with a local delivery business, a monthly box of food was delivered directly to the doorsteps of 350 food-insecure youth in an effort to feed hungry tummies while eliminating transportation and accessibility barriers.

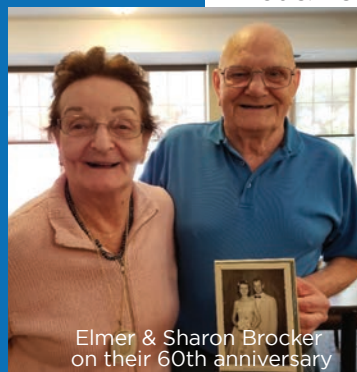
GIFTS THAT GIVE...

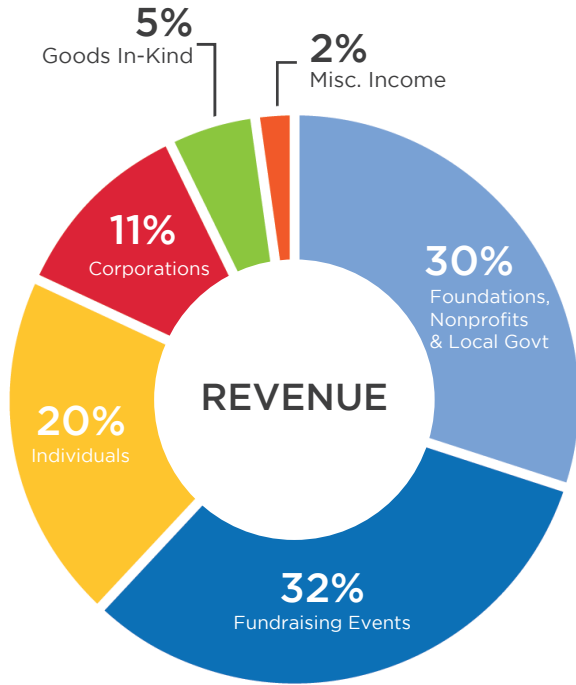

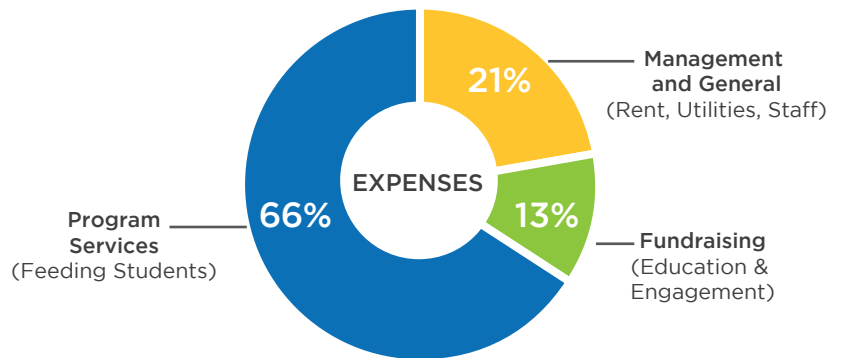
